I have a text against torture in South African art that is probably going to be published in African Arts next year. I've included it is an attachment below. It is a bit heavy but a good talk I think and I'd be willing to give it at your space.

But I also like your idea about commenting on the state of "Africa" (and especially "South Africa") and representation in current international shows and texts. So you can either have:

- 1. the torture talk, an earlier draft of which is enclosed, or
- 2. a discussion of Johannesburg, Dakar, and Venice Biennales,
 The Museum for African Art, The Short Century, and Andre
 Magnin's and Sidney Kasfir's general presentations of
 Contemporary African art. The second talk option would give a
 critical overview of how African identities and African
 objects are currently being positioned in the international
 art (sales) arena, with a mindful eye to how the international
 art arena is being positioned in local art scene contexts in
 Africa.. What can be said to be held in common by these three
 seemingly contradictory strategies in the politics and
 mainstreaming of African representations: exotic essentialisms
 (the always-inscrutible other), strategic essentialisms ("I
 am other"), and the current tendency to priviledge the
 diaspora as itself an object ("there is no other and the best
 example of this are international travellers and refugees")?

If that is the kind of talk you'd prefer I'd be pleased to work up an original abstract for you.
