We had met briefly at the AICA session during the exhibition Europe Unknown in Cracow, Poland where I was one of the two critics representing Turkish artists.

I am currently working as the director of the Third International Istanbul Biennial. You may remember me mentioning a project for a contemporary art museum to be converted from a mid-19th century textile factory, and my hope to install the biennial there. The project is now becoming a reality.

I would very much like to see a Bulgarian contribution in the Biennial. If I ask for a contribution through bureaucratic channels, you can imagine the kind of works I would get. I neither know anything about the current condition of art in Bulgaria nor about her critics and curators. I would be very happy if you would consider a Bulgarian participation of around five works. After your response(s), I will set up a meeting here with the Bulgarian Consulate and see to it that they sponsor the transportation and the travel fares. I will be very happy if you send me some preliminary visual and other material on the artists.
